

- Established 1946
- Sends U.S. academics and professionals overseas and brings scholars and professionals from abroad to the U.S.
- Sponsored by U.S. Department of State's Bureau of Educational and Cultural Affairs
- Administered by the Institute of International Education's Council for International Exchange of Scholars (CIES)

to a golden future.


Research: I interviewed student activists, NGO organizers, protesting farmers, and newly elected district and provincial officials about development projects in South Sumatra.

Professional Impact

- Draft of Book Completed: Indonesian Betrayed: How Development Fails was published in 2007
- New Research: My discussions with students at the National Islamic
 University led me to investigate the rise and spread of Islamist organizations
 on university campuses in Indonesia. "Islam and the Habits of Democracy:
 Islamic Organizations in Post-New Order South Sumatra" was published in
 2004.
- **Expanded Curriculum**: My Fulbright experiences and research led me to develop a new course for Women and Gender Studies entitled "Women and Globalization."







Institutional Impact

- New Institutional Collaborations
 - Ohio University and the National Islamic University in Jakarta were awarded an ALO Partnership Grant for the development of Civic Education in 2003
 - Ohio University and the Center for Research on Intergroup Relations (CERIC) at the University of Indonesia were awarded a grant by the US State Department for Training-of-Trainer Workshops in Conflict Resolution.
 - Both program included opportunities for Ohio University faculty to teach short courses in Indonesia.









Personal Impact

Teaching: Wonderful Indonesian students came to Ohio University to do graduate work

Advising: I was able to mentor Ohio University students who applied for a Fulbright dissertation or ETA award

Engagement: I was able to work with the Indonesian NGO Nurani Dunia which builds schools and helps victims of social or natural disasters
